



Renée R. Taylor Dr. PH.D.

Renée Taylor is a professor of occupational therapy at the University of Illinois at Chicago. She is an internationally-recognized researcher on the psychobiological aspects of post-infectious fatigue and chronic fatigue syndrome. Recently, she has initiated a line of research on therapeutic use of self leading to the development of a new conceptual practice model for occupational therapy. In 1995 and 1997, Taylor received her M.A. and Ph.D. in clinical psychology from DePaul University. She completed post-doctoral training in 1998. Taylor has received over 3 500 000 Dollar in federal research grants and has served on numerous federal and international grant review panels. Currently, she is completing an NIH-funded, prospective study of post-infectious fatigue following acute Epstein-Barr infection in adolescents. The grant aims to identify key biological, psychological, social, and behavioural variables that may converge and be associated with the etiology and course of post-infectious fatigue syndrome. Taylor has published over 70 peer-reviewed articles on fatiguing conditions and five books.

Gary Kielhofner **Dr. P.H., O.T.R.**

Dr. Kielhofner is currently Professor and Wade/Meyer Chair, Department of Occupational Therapy, College of Health and Human Development Sciences, and Professor of Public Health, at the University of Illinois at Chicago. Among other scholarly works, Dr. Kielhofner has worked on the theoretical development, research and application of the Model of Human Occupation for over 30 years. He is the author/editor of 17 books and has published over 130 articles. His work has been translated into multiple languages and has influenced occupational therapy worldwide. Dr. Kielhofner is a fellow of the American Occupational Therapy Association, a member of the Academy of Research of the American Occupational Therapy Foundation, a recipient of the A. Jean Ayres award. He is recipient of 3 honorary Doctoral Degrees, two of which were awarded from European Universities. He was named by the University of Illinois as a University Scholar, a honor bestowed upon only a handful of professors at UIC over the years.
