The Bachelor's degree programme in applied psychology is the first step towards a career as a psychologist. It prepares students for a variety of jobs in healthcare, social services and education, business and administration, and culture. Upon completion of the programme, graduates are awarded a Bachelor of Science in Applied Psychology (BSc). uman experience and behaviour The focus is on describing, explaining, and predicting psychological phenomena. Specifically, psychology examines questions such as: How do we see? How does memory work? How do we think, judge, and make decisions? How do we behave in groups? What are psychological dis-

orders, and what causes them to develop? Psychologists work in all fields in the professional world. And with the ever-changing social developments, this includes more and more new fields.



pplied psychology The goal of applied psychology is practical application and useful implementation of psychological findings and insights. This differs from the pure research that originally comprised scientific psychology. Applied psychology makes a significant practical contribution to the further development and well-being

of society, organizations, teams, and individuals. In addition to the need to understand and treat psychological disorders, applied psychology also seeks solutions for current problems in society. For example, it studies media use by young people, deals with issues in health promotion in companies, throws light on human environmental behaviour, analyses transportation systems, or evaluates the needs of certain social groups for advice and consultation. degree programme with a distinct profile The Bachelor's degree programme at ZHAW teaches the fundamentals of scientific psychology. With this basis, graduates of the psychology programme have broad thematic interests and a high level of professional competence. This generalist profile is not offered by other universi-

ties of applied sciences in Switzerland. The programme is more action- and application-oriented than programmes at universities, and it is especially appropriate for students who wish to prepare for training in specific professional fields.



start in psychology The Bachelor's degree programme is a basic course of study in applied psychology; it does not qualify graduates for independent professional practice. For that, students need to complete a consecutive Master's degree programme in psychology. According to the Swiss Federal Law on Psychology Profes-

sions, only holders of the Master's degree are entitled to use the professional title 'psychologist'. Bachelor's and Master's degrees awarded by universities of applied sciences and by universities are equivalent.

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ull-time or part-time The Bachelor's degree programme can be completed on a full-time or part-time basis. Students must complete 180 ECTS credits. The standard duration of studies for full-time studies is 3 years, or 6 semesters (ca. 30 ECTS credits per semester). The standard duration for part-time studies is 9 semesters (ca. 20 credits per semester).

utlook towards the Master's degree programme Most students start the Master's degree programme directly after completing their Bachelor's degree. Master's students deepen and expand their professional and methodological competencies and their personal and social skills in elective modules. The out-

come is a very individualized, science-based profile with a strong practical orientation.

In addition to 80 ECTS credits in required subjects (research methods, academic skills, applications, internship and workshop), Master's students can study a wide range of topics in core electives. From these options, students put together their individual plan of study for 40 ECTS credits.

dmission requirements Applicants to the Bachelor's degree programme must have the following qualifications:

- Baccalaureate, Federal Vocational Baccalaureate or Specialized Baccalaureate, or teaching certification that qualifies for university entrance
- or diploma from an accredited College of Higher Education (HF/PEI)
- and at least one year of work experience (may be in or not in a field of work in applied psychology)

All applicants must pass a two-part aptitude assessment.
